1. BRIEF PROFILE OF THE DEPARTMENT

When Mizoram became Union Territory in 1972, 'Forest Department' was established headed by Director of Forests (in the rank of Conservator of Forests) as head of department. It was then re-named as Chief Conservator of Forests with creation of new post of Chief Conservator of Forests (CCF) in 1983.


In 1987, 'Forest Department' was re-named as 'Environment & Forests Department' and the head of the department was upgraded from CCF to Principal Chief Conservator of Forests (PCCF) in 1988. With the inclusion of the subject 'Climate Change', 'Environment & Forest Department' was again renamed as 'Environment, Forests & Climate Change Department' in 2016.

2. STATE PROGRAMMES

MIXZORAA,

2.1 Green Mizoram Programme

It was launched in the year 1999 over deep concern about the continuous depletion of vegetation due to various biotic pressures. Apart from organized Mass tree planting by various agencies on Green Mizoram day, a number of seedlings of different tree species were distributed to various local stakeholders free of cost. Earlier, Green Mizoram Day had been observed in the month of June, and actual date had been decided by the State Level Green Mizoram Committee. However, from 2013 onwards, Green Mizoram Day is fixed to be observed on 11th June and since then, it has been observed on 11th June of every year.

2.2 Fire Prevention Programme

Due to prevalence of traditional shifting cultivation, fire outbreak during Jhum burning is a common phenomenon in the state. Besides, other biotic pressures cause forest fire during dry season. Deeply concerned about destruction and degradation of forest due to fire, State Government constituted State Level Committee on Fire prevention under the chairmanship of Hon'ble Chief Minister in the year 2000 in order to frame policy to minimize the occurrence and impact of forest fire to be implemented by District level committee. Important strategies applied include Mass awareness campaign, fixation of Jhum burning day, Felicitation of best performing District/Village etc. Observance of Fire Prevention Week is a regular phenomenon during 1st or 2nd week of February every year wherein mass awareness campaigns are organised throughout the state as per programmes chalked out by all District Level Fire Prevention Committees.

3.3 Project Tiger

Mizoram has one Tiger Reserve known as 'Dampa Tiger Reserve' since 1994 with an area of 1,033 sq km (including buffer zone). Main activities carried out in this area include – i) Anti poaching patrolling (ii) Fire prevention activities (iii) Establishment of animal rescue and rehabilitation Centre (iv) Habitat improvement (v) Assistance to jhum cultivators in fringe villages to create permanent farm land (vi) Fostering tourism by organizing nature camp (vii) Awareness campaign (viii) Research & field equipment (camera trap, compass/range finder) etc.




3.5 National Plan for Conservation of Aquatic Ecosystem (NPCA)

Two wetlands viz. Tamdil and Palak (Pala) are included. Main activities in this scheme include – (i) Fire Prevention activities in catchment areas (ii) Patrolling path (iii) Watershed Management including removal of silt and other unwanted materials (weeds etc) and construction of check dams (iv) Eco-tourism activities like nature trail/ trekking, boating (v) Assisted natural regeneration in catchment area etc.

3.6 National Afforestation Programme (NAP)

Under NAP, plantations have been raised more than 63,000 hectares since 1998 under people's participation through Village Forest Development Committees (VFDCs). However, during 2019-2020, there was no financial achievement since Govt of India did not release fund during this year though all mandatory documents have been submitted. 10. STATE BOARD FOR WILDLIFE (SBWL)

SBWL is chaired by Hon'ble Chief Minister and Chief Wildlife Warden is the member secretary. It consists of 31 members from various corners- state legislature, NGOs, environmentalists, various government departments and representative from Govt. of India.

 8^{th} meeting of SBWL was convened on 13^{th} March, 2020 at Chief Ministers' Conference Hall. Decisions taken are-

- i) SBWL recommended to grant Wildlife Clearance for diversion of Portected Area (Tawi Wildlife Sanctuary) for Alternate Gravity Water Supply Scheme to be carried out by PHED.
- ii) Compensation claimed for human death due to Bee attack was approved to be compensated.
- iii) Proposal for creation of animal corridor (particularly for serow, the state animal) at the highway of Durtlang to enable animals to cross the highway was approved.



11. MIZORAM STATE BIODIVERSITY BOARD (MSBB)

MSBB is chaired by Honb'le Minister of EF&CC and Chief Warden is the member secretary. The board constituted Biodiversity Management Committee in every local bodies within the state of Mizoram, both in rural as well as in urban.

- i) So far 893 BMCs have been constituted.
- ii) Preparation of Peoples' Biodiversity Register (PBR) have been started. So far five PBRs have been completed during 2019-2020.
- iii) International Day for Biologocal Diversity is observed every year on 22nd May by organizing workshop, painting/quiz/photography competition to create awareness.
- iv) Also occasionally organized training for BMC members, discussion programmes etc to spread awareness.

12. WILDLIFE COMPENSATION

During 2019-2020, an amount of Rs 6,82,000.00 (Rupees six lakh eighty two thousand only) has been paid as wildlife compensation throughout the state. Details are tabulated below-

14. SPECIAL REPORT DURING LOCKDOWN DUE TO COVID-19

During the eve of lockdown and actual lockdown period, the duty of forest officers and staff increased to manifolds. So many miscreants took this as chances to commit various forests and wildlife offences like illegal felling/sawing of timber, hunting, poisoning and killing of fishes using Gelignite (blasting gelatin)/Dynamo/Battery etc. and to cause forest fires. Forest officers and field staff tried their best to curb these illegal activities, and seizures made during this short period (March 15-April 25, 2020) are reproduced below-
